TAKE MEETING ROLES

Actively participate in club meetings to develop your speaking, listening, leadership and feedback skills. Through Easy Speak sign up for starter roles such as Ah Counter, Timer, and Grammarian.



USE EASY SPEAK

Easy Speak is our meeting planning and progress tracking tool. It's extremely helpful for both you and club leadership when you use Easy Speak regularly to note attendance, take meeting roles and request speeches.

EXPLORE PATHWAYS

When you're ready, and with the support of an experienced Toastmaster, take a closer look at the Pathways educational program and choose your Path.



DELIVER ICE BREAKER

The Ice Breaker is exactly what you think it is - your first speech where you 'break the ice' as a speaker to introduce yourself to the club. Use the skills you already have and aim to deliver your Ice Breaker shortly after joining.

Who's Who

The elected officers of the Club serve to create a high-quality environment that supports the goals of the members and the growth of the Club Officer Team 2024/2025:

- **President (David):** Our CEO; provides helpful, supportive leadership for all activities
- VP Education (Guenter): Plans each meeting; helps members achieve developmental goals
- VP Membership (Oscar): Maintains contact with guests; helps guests become members
- VP Public Relations (Seti): Promotes the activities of the Club through social media
- Secretary (Florin): Maintains Club records; keeps minutes of Executive Committee meetings
- **Treasurer (Kurt):** Manages Club bank account; transfers member fees to TMI
- Sergeant at Arms (Ankit): Sets up meeting room; manages Club physical inventory
- Immediate Past Pres (Guenter): Supports and guides current
 officer team



Our Meetings

1st and 3rd Mondays of month 19:00 – 21:00 DAI

Members are encouraged to take a role at meetings. Each role helps you practice and develop your communication and leadership skills. Typical Meeting Agenda:

- Introduction: Members and guests welcomed; short warmup round
- Table Topics: One- to two-minute impromptu speeches
- Prepared Speeches: Speeches from Pathways educational program
- **Evaluation:** Evaluation of each speech; feedback on other aspects of meeting

Meeting Roles:

- **Toastmaster:** Hosts meeting by introducing speakers and keeps meeting running on time
- **General Evaluator:** Guides evaluation portion of the meeting and provides overall feedback to improve future meetings
- **Table Topics Master:** Prepares and introduces impromptu topics; leads Table Topics session
- **Speaker:** Prepares and presents speech based on Pathways project
- **Speech Evaluator:** Gives constructive verbal and written comments to Speaker
- **Ah-Counter:** Reports on use of filler words used throughout meeting
- Grammarian: Introduces Word of the Day and reports on use of language during meeting
- **Timer:** Provides timing signals to speakers and reports time of each agenda item



Tools

- Mark attendance
- Take meeting roles
- Request speeches

A suggested flow for completing your Ice Breaker:

- Schedule your speech. Using Easy Speak, request a speech slot for a meeting date that is suitable for you.
- Organize your speech Select three or four interesting aspects of your life that will give your fellow club members insight into and understanding of you as an individual. These might include your birthplace, education, or family. You could explain how you came to be in your present occupation and tell the audience something about your ambitions. Or you could explain the effect an incident from your youth has had on your life. Once have the highlights of your talk in mind, weave them into a story, just as if you were telling it to a group of friends. Share personal experiences the more personal your talk, the warmer the relationship will be between you and the audience.
- **Practice**. Set aside time to rehearse your speech. Practice the talk until you are comfortable with it.
- **Contact your Evaluator**. Let him or her know if there's any special areas of feedback you would like. Ask for support and/or feedback, if you'd like. Provide your Evaluator with the evaluation form, either digitally or printed.
- **Deliver your speech**. Relax, breathe, and enjoy! Think of it as a talk before a group of friends, sharing information of interest. The audience wants you to succeed and they're eager to help you. Feel free to use notes it is your first speech, after all.
- Accept feedback. Your Evaluator will provide you with both a verbal and written evaluation. You may also receive feedback from other audience members. Keep in mind that this feedback is the personal view of the provider and not the absolute truth. Determine which feedback is most helpful for you and aim to apply it in future speeches.

Pathways currently offers 11 different learning paths to choose from. Each Path has a variety of required and elective projects that give you the opportunity to strengthen existing skills and/or try out something new.

The entire Toastmasters program is self-paced, so you make your own plan. Actively participating in Pathways, whatever pace suits you, will benefit both you and the Club.
